

<u>Talking Trazh</u>

The trash service in Windmill Farms has changed. IESI is our new provider and with this change we have added a much requested recycling program. This new service was initiated by the elected members of the Kaufman County Fresh Water Supply District (FWSD) 1-B and FWSD 1-C. There are some changes with the new service.

The first change is the addition of a recycling program. Many residents have requested and supported this environmentally friendly program for years at the annual HOA meetings. The program will begin once the recycle bins have been delivered by IESI. Recycle pick up days will be every Wednesday for all residents. IESI will deliver a list of what materials are accepted for recycling with your bin. A list is also included in this newsletter. If you find that your bin will not hold a weeks worth of recyclable material you accumulate during a week additional bins can be requested from Severn Trent at 469-762-3099.

With your regular trash pick up IESI will also pick up one (1) bulk item per week. Bulk items include up to two (2) cubic yards of brush, tree trimmings, and old appliances. If you want to verify if something is acceptable for trash pick up, please contact Severn Trent at 469-762-3099. Since this bulk pick up is now covered under the new contract, please refrain from using contractors' dumpsters for excess trash. If you previously had more than one trash bin you may want to try using the recycle program before ordering additional cans which may be ordered at an additional charge.

Windmill Ridge (Phase 1) Monday – Trash
Heather Hollow	Tuesday – Trash
Honeysuckle Meadows	Tuesday – Trash
Amber Fields	Wednesday – Trash

Recycling for all of Windmill Farms is on Wednesday

The final change is that now your trash service fees will be included in you water service fees and due monthly instead of quarterly. You will not be required to pay three months worth of trash service at one time as was the case with the previous provider. If you have any questions please contact Severn Trent Services at 469-762-3099.

TRASH CAN STORAGE

During recent inspections we noticed that homeowners are either setting out their trash containers too early or are leaving them out too long after the trash has been collected. Per the Windmill Farms Association's Rules and Regulations, Page1, number 2: "...The containers shall be placed on the curb for collection no earlier than the night before the scheduled collection day, and the contents thereof disposed of regularly as required by the Association or local authority. After collection, the containers shall be promptly returned to the Owner's garage or other location that is screened from view by the public."


In order to help maintain the appearance of your community and to comply with your Association documents, please store your trash containers either in your garage, backyard, or on the side of your house. Remember, it is not acceptable to store your trash containers on your front porch, in the driveway, or anywhere within public view.

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

1 Mile Walk Route: Start Time 9:15am-Starting line is in the Brown Middle School parking lot. The walkers will leave the parking lot and head north (left) on Windmill Farms Blvd. Walkers will stay in the left lane heading north. Walkers will go down Windmill Farms Blvd. and u-turn .6 miles down the road, even with North Forney High School. Walkers will head back towards the school and walk in the right lane, heading south on Windmill Farms Blvd. They will re-enter the parking lot and finish where they started at the front of Brown Middle School.

5K Run Route: Start Time 10:00am-Starting line is in the Brown Middle School parking lot. The runners will leave the parking lot and head north (left) on Windmill Farms Blvd. Runners will stay in the left lane heading north. Runners will go down Windmill Farms Blvd. and u-turn .6 miles down the road (even with North Forney High School.) Runners will head back towards the school and run in the right lane, heading south on Windmill Farms Blvd. Runners will then take a right on Cobblestone and a right on Songbird. The runners will continue down Songbird (it turns into Aster) and turn right on Dewberry. The runners will then take a left on Sumac, a left on Iron Gate, and a left on Reeder. The runners will take a right on Windmill Farms and finish in the school parking lot where the race began.

Lanes will be blocked off from 8:00am-10:00am

• Windmill Farms Blvd. Heading North- If at all possible, we would like to section off the left lane heading north on Windmill Farms Blvd. Our plans is to section the lane off from the Brown Middle School's entrance to the u-turn in front of North Forney High School.

• Windmill Farms Blvd. Heading South-If at all possible, we would like to section off the right lane heading south on Windmill Farms Blvd. from the u-turn (even with North

Forney High School) to the Brown Middle School entrance.

• Reeder Road Heading East-If at all possible, we would like to block off Reeder Road from Iron Gate to Windmill Farms Blvd.

Landscape Committee Report January 15, 2009

Activity of the Committee has been slow over the last few months.

- * Yard of the Season: For "winter" we selected a resident in each neighborhood based on holiday decorations. The winners and pictures of the yards will be included in the upcoming newsletter. The high winds continue to be a big problem with damaging the yard signs. Due to damage and schedule of volunteers we were not able to repair the signs to display December yard winners.
- * The Committee is still interested in planning an Arbor Day Celebration community event for April 2009. It would also be timely to include a booth providing information on recycling and composting at the event. The main issue with pulling this together is getting enough volunteers and sponsorship/funding support from the local businesses.

The Value of Trees to a Community Submitted by: Jamie Coleman

"Healthy, mature trees add an average of 10% to a property owner's value." USDA Forest Service

"Trees properly placed around buildings can reduce air conditioning needs by 30% and can save 20-50 percent in energy used for heating."

"One acre of forest absorbs six tons of carbon dioxide and puts out four tones of oxygen. This is enough to meet annual needs of 18 people."

YARD & LANDSCAPE TIPS

Texas AgriLife Extension -Kaufman County Master Gardeners

January

- This is an excellent time to transplant established trees and shrubs.
- The dormant season of winter is also the time to do any needed pruning of shade trees to correct major problems. Cleaning out dead wood, removing lower limbs, and crowded branches (to allow more light to reach the ground), and removing hazardous branches which threaten property.
- Feed trees and shrubs to provide all the nutrients needed for a growing season. A combination of quick release and slow release nitrogen is best.

February

- Plant groundcovers and cool season annuals such as calendula, hollyhocks and nasturtiums.
- Before buds begin to swell for spring, finish pruning summer flowering trees and shrubs. Do not prune spring flowering plants such as spirea (bridal wreath), azalea, forsythia, or quince until after they bloom. Follow these steps: (1) prune out any dead and damaged branches first; (2) thin by removing about one-third of the canes or stems at ground level, removing the oldest canes only; (3) shape the rest of the plant but do not cut everything back to the same height. Maintain natural forms.
- Early to mid-February apply a pre-emergent herbicide for lawns that had a summer weed problem last year to kill germinating seed. Mild weather may trigger weed germination. A second application may be needed in late May or early June. The best defense against lawn weeds is a healthy, thick turf resulting from good management. Don't rely on chemicals alone!

March

- Plant cool season annual flowers, e.g., alyssum, pinks, snapdragons, and petunias. Finish digging and dividing summer and fall flowering perennials early in month before new growth begins. Wait until soil temperature reaches 70 degrees F to plant caladium bulbs which may rot in cooler soil temperatures.
- Control winter weeds by starting your regular mowing regime. Get your mower blade sharpened. If you decide to scalp your lawn, wait until all danger of freezing is over. If you scalp, turn that huge amount of clippings into a fine soil amendment by composting it. Apply broad-leafed weed killer to eliminate henbit, chickweed, dandelions, clover and other non-grassy weeds. If you missed applying a pre-emergent weed preventive in February and you had a summer weed problem in your lawn last year (e.g., grass burs), then make an application now. You may have missed a portion of the weeds, which germinate in early spring (like crabgrass), but will still control the many other types that can germinate anytime during the warm part of the year.
- Prune to shape as needed spring flowering shrubs immediately after they finish blooming and before new leaf growth begins. Finish pruning shade trees before buds start to swell. Prune crepe myrtles, but only to remove twiggy internal stubble or unwanted branches such as those that cross and rub. Please no topping or trimming entire plant! You'll be rewarded with a better shaped and heavy flowering tree or shrub.
- Apply high nitrogen fertilizer to be used this month: 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 to grasses (rye and fescue), spring-flowering shrubs and vines immediately after they finish blooming.

The next Kaufman County Master Gardener meeting is February 2nd at 9 am at the AgriLife Extension Office located at 2471 N. State Hwy 34 in Kaufman

The meetings are open to the public and will include an educational offering.


SBB Management Company (SBB) partnered with Advanced Technology Group (ATG) and eUnify to provide an extra service for the owners in community associations we manage. Many owners are accustomed to checking their bank balances, utility and credit card statements on line—now you can check your homeowner's association account on-line as well!

The information is accessed through a web portal via SBB's website. Owners can view their individual account, as well as an association calendar, notices of events, announcements and pdf files of association documents (CC & R's, Bylaws, Architectural Review forms, financial statements, etc.).

Owners access their account information via SBB's website at www.sbbmanagement.com. Please click on the "Residents" tab and then "Owner Sign In". First time users will have to enter their last name as it appears on the association account statement you receive from SBB, their account number and a valid email address. Owners will receive an initial Resident Log In and Password which can be changed on subsequent visits to the site.

When owners log in they are taken to a screen like the one below. Owners can enter and update their personal information at any time—email addresses, telephone numbers and so on. SBB will also have access to the information to update the association's database.
